Hi, I'm Hope, a PhD researcher at UNESCO (RILA). My research is 'Co-creating the Values of World Heritage Sites with Refugees: A World View Perspective.' I'm doing the 'We are Living Heritage and We Share World Heritage' project with refugees, asylum seekers, heritage professionals, and museums.

The primary aim of this project is to transform World Heritage Sites into places that truly belong to all of us. They should represent multiple truths and diverse worldviews, decentralize, and redistribute power, and be inclusive, allowing everyone to find a sense of belonging as a human being.

One sentence I often express is: 'The Values of World Heritage Sites are outstanding, but it is humanity that makes them universal.'

That's why I write stories. As the author of 'The Science of Storytelling,' Storr, aptly said: 'Good stories are explorations of the human condition; thrilling voyages into foreign minds (Storr, 2020, p. 42).' Stories let us wonder and wow. They encourage us to reflect on what we already know and prompt us to explore the unknown.

So today, I will share with you a story about dreams, utopia, and friendship. The inspiration comes from the famous philanthropist and Utopian idealist, Robert Owen. He once said, 'I love New Lanark and make my dream come true.'

I visited New Lanark, one of the six World Heritage Sites in Scotland, renowned for its industrial communities created by David Dale and Robert Owen. It embodies Owen's humanism and utopia. However, I wonder if it is a utopian place for others—both humans and animals, for people living here and those who were not living here.

I wonder because We perceive and experience the world differently because we have diverse worldviews. 'One man's heaven might be another man's hell.' Even utopia might hold different meanings for different people.

Therefore, I wrote a story and shared it on the Fairies and Folktales Day in New Lanark this October. It was a sunny Saturday when Tawona, Andy, and I shared our stories, and many

families joined to enjoy Storytime. After storytelling, we also made origami and danced together. I enjoyed and appreciated Iris, Yi-Ting, and Lupin for their help. The wonderful day cannot be replicated, but the story can be shared again and again. So, now I am going to share it with you: 'Annie's Utopia: Weaving Dreams and Creating Change in New Lanark.'

Once upon a time, there was a little girl named Annie. She is curious and energetic; she has a deep love for nature and has a dream to explore the world. However, she never completed her assignments at the Cotton Mill in New Lanark because the noise of the machines and the repetitive routine of producing cotton yarn didn't resonate with her. Instead, Annie likes to sneak out of the mill and lie on the grass, spending her time pondering about the origin of cotton and the destinations of the yarns and clothing, playing with her animal friends, she listened to birds sing, playing with squirrels and saying how are you to highland cows. Day by day, her mother grew worried about her lack of focus and discipline at work. 'Annie, you must work hard. Mr. Owen created a wonderful place for us, and if you don't work, you won't be able to stay,' her mother emphasized.

'But this isn't my utopia. I want to see the world,' Annie replied defiantly, resisting the pressure to conform.

Annie was excited but also worried because she had little knowledge of spinning and weaving, let alone designing and sewing beautiful patterns. She pondered day and night, losing sleep over it. Just when she was about to give up, her animal friends—a curious squirrel, a witty bird, and a gentle highland cow—appeared.

Annie poured out her worries to her animal friends, and surprisingly, the three animals agreed to help her.
